

Summer School Scholarship

Report to EST Congress, Aarhus, September 2016

Students who are preparing a doctoral dissertation in the field of Translation Studies (which includes interpreting and localization) are invited to apply for this scholarship of 1,000 euros. Applicants must be EST members at the time of applying.

The grant can be for any summer school organized in the field of Translation Studies for the purpose of training researchers.

The Committee has been chaired by Iwona Mazur of the Adam Mickiewicz University, Poland, with generous assistance from Esther Torres-Simón of the Rovira i Virgili University, Spain, in 2015. The members of the committee have been comprised Barbara Ahrens, Alexandra Assis Rosa, Franz Pöchhacker and Sonia Vandepitte.

In 2014 the scholarship went to [Paweł Korpala](#), a doctoral student at the Faculty of English, Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań, Poland. His research project was *A psychological profile of an interpreter: Stress management, willingness to take risks, extra-/introversion* and is supervised by Dr. Agnieszka Chmiel. He received 1,000 euros to attend the [FTI Research Methods Summer School](#) in Geneva. The committee received and carefully evaluated nine applications, representing various branches of Translation Studies, including Bible translation, literary translation, interpreting, and process-oriented translation research.

The winner in 2015 was Juho Suokas of the University of Eastern Finland for his project on the "Practical Application of Usability Methods in Translation", supervised by Riitta Jääskeläinen and Kaisa Koskinen. He received 1,000 euros to attend [Emuni Agricola International Translation Studies Summer School](#).

In 2016 the prize went to İnci Sarız-Bilge, a doctoral student at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in the United States. Her research project is *The Nexus of Ideology, Ethics, and Translation in Turkey (1990s-Present)* and is being supervised by Professor Edwin Gentzler. She will receive 1,000 euros to attend the CETRA Summer School 2016 in Antwerp, Belgium. The committee received nine applications this year, representing branches of Translation Studies including Bible translation, sign language translation, cultural translation, interpreting, and process-oriented translation research.
